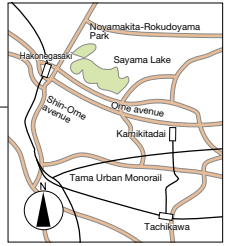


Noyamakita-Rokudoyama Park

- Transport 10-minute walk from Yokota, Choenji, Mine or Kishi bus stop on Tachikawa Bus for Hakonegasaki or Mitsufuji from Tachikawa (JR Chuo line). 10-minute walk from Yokota, Choenji, Mine or Shimin-Sogo-Taiikukan-iriguchi bus stop on Musashi-Murayama city circle route bus for Mitsugi-Chiku-Kaikan from Kamikitada (Tama Urban Monorail).

Located on the western edge of Sayama Natural Park, this park has dense green woods in a greatly varying landscape. In this largest metropolitan park, many people including park volunteers work to develop its environment. The park can be enjoyed by wide range of generation through nature watching, events to experience the woods, and hiking to enjoy each season.

Woods and valley

Much of the park is covered with deciduous trees such as konara oak, sawtooth oak, and storax. Seasonal changes begin in early spring, when the mountainside glows a yellowish-green color as early varieties of violets and dogtooth violets begin to bloom, followed by the first green of April. The park becomes a layground for Japanese rhinoceros beetles, butterflies, and frogs in the summer. By autumn, the leaves turn yellow and eventually defoliate in winter leaving a forest ideal for bird watching. Spring water from the hills is drawn into the valley to create rice paddies and a landscape dotted by swamps that serve as the habitat for various life forms.

Miyanoi valley

Countryside experience area

Miyanoi valley has been developed as a countryside experience area and many park volunteers work on rice paddies and crop fields, maintenance of forests, and organizing various events. The base for those activities is the country house recreated based on actual Edo era houses found in the Sayama Hills area. A main house with four asymmetrical rooms as well as a warehouse, work shed, and storeroom have been constructed and are used to learn about and experience country life. In addition to its use for various events, the house provides hikers to Miyanoi valley a place where they can relax and forget the time.

Play forest
