Ueno Zoological Gardens was established on March 20, 1882, as the first zoo in Japan and celebrated its 130th anniversary in 2012. At the time of opening, the animals were limited to bears, monkeys, foxes, raccoons, water birds, and small birds. However, the zoo currently breeds and exhibits animals from around the world such as giant pandas and western gorillas.

Viewing Animals

The active and healthy behaviors of animals are desirable. There is something about the behaviors unique to wildlife that fascinates people. Some of the examples are observing a polar bear's dynamic actions underwater, aye-ayes using their long middle finger to eat their food, and Japanese macaques playing with equipment in various ways beyond people's imaginations. Care has been taken to make the captive environment of natural habitats, and to allow wild animals to exhibit their abilities and instincts so that visitors can observe.

Viewing Habitats

By creating an environment that replicates the habitats of animals, visitors can see how they live. At the Gorilla Woods and Tiger Forest in the east section, western gorillas rest amongst the greenery and Sumatra tigers and Indian lions come in and out of

Historical Facilities

While there are new facilities including Wildlife Helth Center (since 2016) and Children's Zoo STEP (since 2018), Ueno Zoo still has buildings that tell its long history in different parts of the park. Five-storied pagoda of former Kaneiji Temple (1639), Kankantei Teahouse, originally built by a feudal lord Toudou Takatora and restored in 1878, and Kankantei birdcage, which reflect the image of the park back in the old days when it was just opened.
